This rising star as a CHA-I during her first two years of training has dealt not only with the usual patients we all see on a daily basis but also unusual stressful cases which many CHA/Ps may never see in their entire career. For example during her first summer as a CHA she was one of two providers who took care of victims from a multi-fatality vehicle accident; she has treated serious hypothermia from fishermen whose boat sank, and a cardiac arrest -all experiences which were attended to with composure and grace that far exceeded many providers with decades of experience. She serves on the emergency medical services squad which uses the back of a pick-up truck or Suburban to transport patients to the clinic. This requires her as an ETT to think out-of-the-box when trying to slide some of our larger patients on backboards in/out of vehicles which are not ambulances that have double doors and space for the both the provider and patient. This year she has completed FEMA incident command courses to be better prepared for disasters and has single-handedly prepared emergency management totes for her community which include triage tags, red-yellow-green-black tarps to help make sorting patients easier, clipboards, white-boards, dressings and incident command vests which we plan to use in all of our visit sites. In short this rising star has helped her people and potentially through her single-handed efforts will someday save countless lives because the clinic is prepared for disaster response. Her dedication attributes great credit to herself, Tribal Health and the Community Health Aide/Practitioner program.




